Each summer, students from various school districts come to Aspire to participate in the Work Skills Program. Local businesses including, Andersons, the Millennium Hotel, T.G.I. Fridays, Chili's, and Catalyst Fitness, welcome summer interns for hands on work-related training. The interns learn a variety of skills that will assist them in securing meaningful employment in the future. Students foster communication, team-work, self-advocacy, and independency skills while learning how to complete a variety of job-specific tasks including food preparation, cleaning, and the sorting and folding of laundry. In addition to learning workrelated skills, students further develop money, time, careers, mathematics, reading, writing, and cooking skills. Culminating the summer session, Work Skills' student interns (and staff) throw a themed party where interns are presented with certificates of job skill training. The students also present written speeches about their job sites and enjoy a delicious spread of food and vibrant music. This year's theme was "Super Heroes!"


TECHNOLOGY TODAY:

Connecting Communities

Technology Today uses the Internet for many of its daily activities. The program sites in Buffalo and Tonawanda have been successfully using cloud-based technology for the past 18 months through the use of Google Applications. Participants are able to communicate with family and friends via personal Gmail accounts, they can create and share documents using Google Drive, and manage activities by using Google Calendar. Also, many have met people from around the world using Google Hangouts with their peers.

This fall, Technology Today will be offering live, web-based technology instruction from both the Buffalo and Tonawanda sites. Students participating in Aspire's World of Work program, a group from People Inc.'s CAPP program, and members of the local community will participate in these instructional opportunities to learn more about current technology.
